It is remarkable that lives lost in this apocalypse are so few in number. That said, the range and number of *non-death* losses are staggering and, as we know, loss-effects ripple *far beyond* those directly affected. In the same way Hospice Volunteers are urged to guard against the cumulative effect of repetitive emotional strains, it will be important for those touched by this fire to find moments and ways to prioritize self.

Nonetheless, 130 participants, including many local politicians and community partners, helped bring awareness to DHH as well as 90% of its targeted fundraising goal. <u>ABOUT RAYMOND</u>: Raymond Mark, our 2016 June Callwood Circle Awardee is a psychotherapist with his own private practice, who specializes in grief counseling. He's also a committed DHH volunteer who generously donates one day, each week to our bereaved clients.

Three years ago, Raymond became curious about palliative care. Reading lead to course work. A desire to give back to the community and volunteering with DHH seemed a natural fit. He enrolled in the five-week training program and was, initially, an Oasis Program Volunteer. It wasn't long before Raymond moved to where he felt he could make the strongest contribution – bereavement support. Now, one day a week, Raymond does assessments and facilitates 1:1 counseling sessions with DHH clients. His empathy and professional skills help support our clients along their grief journeys.

Raymond loves the atmosphere at Doane House and the people who he describes as "marvelous." He feels humbled in being granted the opportunity to volunteer in the way he does and says he is honoured to be entrusted to supporting people in their bereavement.

BILL C-14 M.A.I.D update:

BILL C-14 An Act to amend the Criminal Code and to make related amendments to other Acts





Details regarding the Liberal's draft legislation for Bill C-14 were made public just as the April E-News was published. The draft rejected key recommendations made by the joint committee. Notable omissions included: the non-inclusion of assisted dying for the mentally ill, no allowance for advance directives and limiting M.A.I.D to those 18 yrs. or older. As anticipated, considerations and most other details about how assisted dying will be made available to Canadians are up to provinces and territories to decide. And contentious issues such as conscientious objections by practitioners or religious health care institutions were not part of the draft. Some argue that the draft legislation is not "Carter ruling. But Parliament is not bound to the conditions laid out in *Carter v Canada*. Time's running out! The legislation now goes through the parliamentary process, with the likelihood of amendments along the way. It then goes to the Senate for its approval. Will it be a free or whip vote? Hopefully, the final legislation will be a collaborative law, allowing the input of all members and respectful of all Canadians and their Charter rights.



JUST HOW SQUEEZED DOES A GOVERNMENT FUNDED \$\$\$ GET BEFORE IT GETS TO DHH??







Short answer? A LOT!!!

As shown in the pictures below, a Government funded \$ is really stretched along its way to Hospices like ours: from Federal coffers to each province, to the LHIN we're in. (#8) Then, \$\$\$ in our Central LHIN are allocated to many health programs. Currently, **PCNYR** receives and disperses equally to 5 area Community Hospices. The \$ amount received has not increased in many years nor does it take into account the # of client's served, or as is the case with DHH, the continuing increase in requests for services/support.




In 2013/14, Central LHIN's budget of \$1.9 billion was allocated across a range of health programs through 112 Service Accountability Agreements delivered by our health service providers, including

- · Six public and two private hospitals
- 46 long-term care homes
- 33 community support service providers
- 21 mental health and addictions service providers
- One community care access centre (CCAC)
- · Two community health centres

Note that some health service providers deliver care and services in multiple sectors.

As a funder, planner and manager of the local health system, Central LHIN works to identify priorities, allocate resources and plan for appropriate services to improve the health care system for everyone.
